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List of employees:

Frank J. Bang, sales representative for Maddock Pottery 1912. (Oct. 10, 1912 issue of Crockery and Glass Journal - article about him being struck by auto.)

Veronica L. Bogdam Chiarello. Worked for Scammell China, but job title unknown. Died February, 1999.

Augusto W. (Gus) Ciucci 1919-2000). Worked for Scammell prior to being employed at Robertson Manufacturing Co., Trenton. Job at Lamberton unknown.

Frieda Rose (Rosie) Consolloy (1920-2013). Frieda worked as a secretary in the Scammell office after graduating from Hamilton High School in 1937 and then attending Rider College.

Pauline Debnarik (nee Placko). Pauline was born Nov. 25, 1913, in Kosariska, Hungary. Pauline came to America with her father in 1936. In 1945, she married Nick Debnarik and they moved to 531 Home Ave., within walking distance of the Lamberton Works, where she was employed for a period of time before going to work at the General Motors facility in Ewing. Job at Lamberton Works unknown. On Nov. 25, 2012, she celebrated her 100th birthday at Trenton Sokol Lodge 59.

Anthony L. Dragonetti (pattern designer). 1940 - Was a trustee of the Marconi Catholic Men's Club, whose purpose was social welfare, friendship among its members. Head designer from 1949 until closing. Died November 11, 1993.

Michael Furda (kiln-drawer). Died circa 1951 when he fell into a pit in floor of Scammell factory.

Charles May in 1912 served on Art and Design Committee of the United States Potters Association. (Nov. 14, 1912 issue of Crockery and Glass Journal)

Bill Nye (traveling salesman for Maddock Pottery in 1921. (Crockery & Glass Journal Nov. 10, 1921).

Jean Shaedle (nee Kenner). Born 1925 in Tamaqua, PA., died Oct. 2, 2015 in Hamilton, NJ where she had resided for 67 years. Jean was employed as an artist at Scammell China. (information: Kingston & Kemp Funeral Home, Hamilton)

Hugo Stockburger (1906-2007). Hugo was born in Germany. He arrived at Ellis Island Nov. 26, 1923. His aunt, Friederke Lang, who paid for his passage, lived at 21 Sheridan Ave., in Trenton. In 1924, while living with his aunt, Hugo got a job at the Lamberton Works as a kiln man. One of his jobs was to carry pottery around on his head in heavy clay boxes (saggers) "It really pressed into your scalp. That's how I started losing my hair," he said. In 1927, he took a job with the Trenton State Police, as a cook. He retired

from the New Jersey State Police as a Major.

James T. Sullivan From 1915 until 1921, Mr. Sullivan was advertising manager of the Thomas Maddock's Sons Co. Around September of 1921 he left that job to become sales manager of the Hibbert Printing Co. of Trenton. By 1929, he was working for Scammell China in their New York sales office at 70E. 45th Street.

T. F. Tunstall (Maddock Pottery sales representative). He had an office in the Hotel Wallick on Broadway in NYC. (Pottery, Glass & Brass Salesman trade journal, 1916, 1918)
